

There continues to be a steady decline in the number of inmates housed by the OPSO. On July 1, 2024, there were 1,380 inmates in OPSO custody and that was the last time there were fewer inmates than the 1,414 in custody on March 3, 2025.

Inmates averaged 8.7 months in custody, and over 90% were held for felony charges.

There were 12 inmates who made up 1% of the population that did not have pending charges. The remaining 99% were held awaiting resolution of charges filed against them or had a warrant or probation/parole hold keeping them in custody.

Violent felonies were the most common charges, with 58% of the inmate population having an open violent felony charge. The largest group of violent felony inmates were the 232 held for murder who had been in custody an average of over 22 months.

The biggest declines in inmates were 13 fewer held for warrants or probation/parole violations, 11 fewer held for felony domestic violence charges, and 10 fewer held for robbery charges.

There were 100 inmates held for misdemeanor charges that included 54 with violent misdemeanors and 33 with a warrant or court hold. Only 2 inmates had misdemeanor drug charges as the most serious offense holding them in custody.

Generally, the OPSO has limited ability to reduce the inmate population. Aside from the time it takes to process inmates cleared for release, inmates are held in custody while awaiting screening decisions from prosecutors or for their charges to be resolved under a judge's case management.

Methodology: The MCC received a list of OPSO inmates and charges that were filed against them. Inmates were categorized by the most serious actively pending charge holding them in custody.
