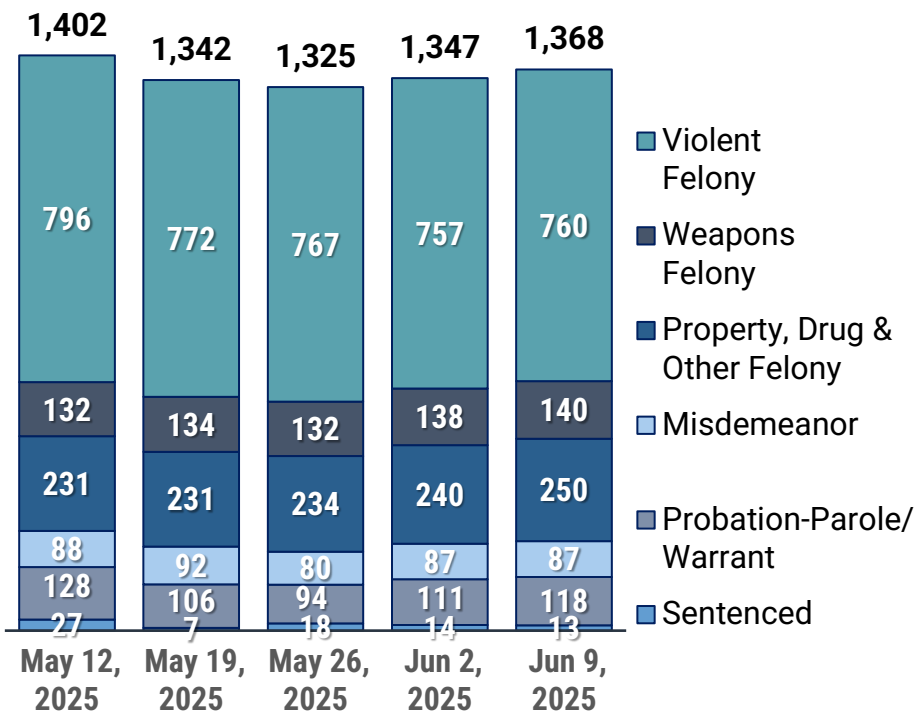




OPSO INMATE POPULATION SNAPSHOT

JUNE 9, 2025

Inmates in Orleans Parish Sheriff's Office Custody – Five Week Trend



The number of OPSO inmates went up for the second week in a row to 1,368 on June 9, 2025.

10 inmates escaped on May 16th, 2025, and the inmate population declined over the following two weeks. On June 2nd, 2025, the inmate population began to go up again. As of June 9, 2025, two of the 10 escaped inmates remained at large.

More than 90% of inmates were held for felony charges, which includes 56% held for violent felony charges and another 10% held for weapons felony charges.

Suspects charged with property felonies made up 11% of the population, and their charges included 58 held for burglary, 73 held for felony theft, and 15 with other property felonies such as criminal damage or unauthorized entry of a business.

Inmates held for drug felony charges made up 4% of the population and included 33 charged with drug distribution and 22 charged with drug possession.

There were 118 inmates or 9% of the population with probation/parole holds or warrants keeping them in custody.

There were 13 inmates who were 17 years of age. They included one female who had been in custody for nine days under a warrant from Juvenile Court.

The 12 male 17-year-old inmates had been in custody an average of four months and included 2 charged with homicide, 3 charged with attempted homicide, 2 charged with robbery, 2 charged with battery or assault, and 3 charged with burglary.

Generally, the OPSO has limited ability to reduce the inmate population. Aside from the time it takes to process inmates cleared for release, inmates are held in custody while awaiting screening decisions from prosecutors or for their charges to be resolved under a judge's case management.

Methodology: The MCC received a list of OPSO inmates and charges that were filed against them. Inmates were categorized by the most serious actively pending charge holding them in custody.
