
OPSO INMATE POPULATION SNAPSHOT





With 1 additional inmate since last week, the population in Orleans Parish Sheriff's Office custody rose for the eighth consecutive week to 1,470 on July 21, 2025.

Inmates with pending felony charges or felony warrants or probation/parole holds made up over 90% of the population.

Two thirds (66%) had pending violent felony (55%) or weapons felony (11%) charges.

On May 16, 2025, 10 inmates escaped from OPSO custody, and 66 days later, 1 remained at large.

There were 175 female inmates who made up 12% of the population. Females had been in custody an average of 143 days, compared to the average of 253 days in custody for male inmates.

Pending violent felonies were the reason that 45% of female inmates and 56% of male inmates were in OPSO custody. Weapons felonies were the most serious pending charges against 2% of female inmates and 12% of male inmates.

Inmates charged with homicide or violent felony sex crimes spent the longest times in custody.

There were 219 inmates held for homicide who average 655 days or 21 and a half months in jail. Inmates held under homicide charges included 15 for 1st degree murder, 198 for 2nd degree murder, and 6 for manslaughter.

Rape and violent sex crimes were the most serious charges holding 64 inmates in custody. They averaged 516 days or 17 months in jail. Charges holding them in custody included 32 for 1st degree rape, 8 for 2nd degree rape, 11 for 3rd degree rape, 7 for sexual battery, and 6 for violent sex crimes against children.

Generally, the OPSO has limited ability to reduce the inmate population. Inmates are held in custody while awaiting screening decisions from prosecutors or for their charges to be resolved under a judge's case management.

Methodology: The MCC received a list of OPSO inmates and charges that were filed against them. Inmates were categorized by the most serious actively pending charge holding them in custody.
